What is the most important information I should have about warfarin tablets?

Warfarin tablets can increase your risk of bleeding. This is because warfarin tablets can affect the way your body uses certain vitamins. - You may have a higher risk of bleeding if you take warfarin tablets and:
 - are 65 years of age or older
 - have a history of stomach or intestinal bleeding
 - have high blood pressure (hypertension)
 - have a history of stroke, or "mini-strokes" (transient ischemic attacks or TIAs)
 - have various heart diseases
 - have a low blood count or cancer
 - have had trauma, such as an accident or surgery
 - have kidney problems
 - use other medicines that increase your risk of bleeding, including:
 - aspirin that treats heart pain
 - other medicines to prevent or treat blood clots
 - nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs)
 - take warfarin tablets for a long time. Warfarin tablets, USP is the active ingredient in warfarin sodium.

Tell your healthcare provider if you take any of these medicines. Ask your healthcare provider if you are not sure if your medicine is one that causes.

Keep other medicines (as directed) with warfarin tablets and allow the doctor to know of all medicines you are taking. Do not change or stop any of your medicines or start any new medicines without your doctor's approval.

Do not take other medicines that contain warfarin sodium while taking warfarin sodium.

Get your regular blood tests to check for your response to warfarin sodium.

This blood test is called an INR test. The INR test checks to see how fast your blood clots. Your doctor will tell you how often you should have this test. The INR test will tell you how well you are responding to warfarin sodium.

Call your healthcare provider right away if you get any of the following signs or symptoms of bleeding:

- **bleeding**
 - nosebleeds
 - bleeding from your gums
 - unusual bruising or bleeding without known cause or from a site
 - bleeding from your eyes
 - unusual bleeding from your mouth
 - unusual bleeding from your skin
 - bleeding from your vagina
 - bleeding from your rectum
 - bleeding from your penis
 - bleeding from your skin

Who should not take warfarin sodium?

Do not take warfarin sodium if:

- you have a history of bleeding problems or higher than normal levels of potassium. Your healthcare provider will check your potassium levels before you start taking warfarin sodium.
- you are pregnant unless you have a prescription for warfarin sodium. Warfarin sodium may cause birth defects, miscarriage, or death of your unborn child.
- you are allergic to warfarin or any of the other ingredients in warfarin sodium. See the end of this leaflet for a complete list of ingredients in warfarin sodium.

What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking warfarin sodium?

Before you take warfarin sodium, tell your healthcare provider if you:

- are taking any other medicines, including over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, or supplements.
- have had any recent surgery or dental procedures.
- have any other medical conditions.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. See "Who should not take warfarin sodium?" Your healthcare provider will tell you if you should take warfarin sodium if you are pregnant.
- have any allergies, including to any of the ingredients in warfarin sodium.
- have had any recent surgery or dental procedures.
- have any other medical conditions.

How should I take warfarin sodium?

Take warfarin sodium exactly as prescribed. Your healthcare provider will adjust your dose if you are not responding to your current dose.

Do not take warfarin sodium with grapefruit or grapefruit juice. Warfarin sodium may interact with grapefruit or grapefruit juice.

Do not take warfarin sodium with alcohol. Warfarin sodium may interact with alcohol.
